BUSY SUMMER BEHIND THE SCENES @ THE LOCAL

This issue of The Bulletin features our 19th Annual Local 728 Scholarship award winners. Fifteen highly deserving students were recipients – one of the largest groups we’ve had in the scholarship program’s history. With all the negative news about labor unions, what’s often overlooked is the foundation of our organization: members helping members. There are not many people outside of a union who enjoy the member-only benefits we have, and I’m particularly proud of our scholarship program. It is very gratifying to be able to provide some financial assistance to these worthy students and their parents to help them with the escalating costs of a higher education.

I want to thank the Scholarship Committee and the staff for all of their work on the award process. And on behalf of the Executive Board, the Officers and the entire membership, congratulations to all of the 2017 winners. We wish you nothing but continued success in your educational pursuits.

It’s been a busy summer at the Local. At the end of June, Jason Lord, Business Representative Patric Abaravich and myself met with International President Loeb and Vice President Mike Miller to discuss the Programmer’s proposals for the next round of contract negotiations with AMPTP. Miller made it a point to mention that ours was the best prepared proposal they’ve seen and while President Loeb has pledged the IATSE’s support, he was careful to make sure we manage our expectations. We don’t know what the AMPTP is going to ask from us and we don’t know what the political landscape will be at the time.

Our first Trustees meeting was held on July 7th. In order to give the trio a complete overview, the Local’s CPA provided training on how our systems work and offered his perspectives on the roles and responsibilities of the Trustees. Additionally, Pascal Guillemard and I went over specific structures and safeguards we already have in place.

The appointment of our first-ever Trustees is just another example of how dedicated the Local 728 Executive Board is to doing all they can to protect our interests in ensuring the Local is able to adapt to a rapidly changing world. All of our Officers have pledged to attend the IATSE’s Officer Training Institute this year and that is only the beginning of what they are doing to make sure that the future is bright. During a recent meeting with International President Loeb, he even commented on how impressed he was with the activism by our officers.

I’m also pleased to report that 14 delegates attended the IATSE Quadrennial

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

On June 27, the California IATSE Council (CIC), Unite HERE and the California Labor Federation joined a host of Labor Unions and business organizations and descended on the Capitol lawn in Sacramento to lobby in support of SB 17.

Senate Bill 17, the Drug Pricing Transparency Bill, is commonsense legislation that will provide consumers with exactly what it's named: transparency in drug pricing. Hospitals and insurance companies are already required to disclose basic information which has helped bring costs down, but not prescription drugs, and those prices are far too high. As an example, every time insulin goes up or a company decides to dramatically raise the cost of an asthma inhaler, or the infamous EpiPen going up to \$600 each, we pay more in copays or premiums, or both.

The full day of lobbying included one-on-one meetings with legislators to get their support. Our hope is the Bill gets through the different Committees and comes up for a full Senate vote in the next legislative session.

This hands-on, full court press by Labor is essential and just one way we are working legislatively on your behalf with state leaders. Then there is federal legislation ... where it seems that every gain for working Americans in the last 50 years is under assault. While many news sources highlight the ongoing White House leaks and the Russian investigation, changes adversely affecting the environment, public education and labor laws are falling under the radar. As an example, the Trump Administration filed court papers that would rewrite the Obama-

era federal overtime rules. Naturally, that change would favor big business, not the employee.

On the flipside, a National push and grassroots outcry narrowly stopped the complete repeal of the Affordable Care Act (ACA). But we can't be fooled. Repealing this legislation is still top priority for Trump and the Republican-led House and Senate.

While Congress is on August recess, this is the perfect time to attend your representative's town hall meeting (if they're brave enough to have one) and voice your opinion. You can also call your rep's office, email them or share your thoughts on their social media pages. To find your rep visit, www.whoismyrepresentative.com and www.findyourreplegislature.ca.gov/. What's important is that you make your voice heard now before they get back to Washington, D.C.

Let me leave you with something positive: Funds were recently dispersed for the third fiscal year of California's expanded film incentive program. Three big budget films *Captain Marvel*, *Midway* and *Island Plaza* were all selected to receive the tax credits under California's Film and Television Tax Credit Program 2.0.

A total of 92 projects had applied for tax credits under this year's first round allocation period (June 27-July 8). Nearly \$68 million was allocated to eight independent and studio productions. But the program made a point of touting the big-budget films. Productions with budgets of more than \$75 million were ineligible under the first tax credit program. Now expanded and called Program 2.0, the tax incentives are open to films of any budget.

course load. She's been a member of the California Scholarship Federation Club for three years and earned a National Merit Scholarship Letter of Commendation for her PSAT score of 1430. Additionally, Haley served as Secretary for the National Honor Society Club and Secretary for the National Organization for Women Club at her school.

The scholar-athlete was also captain of the Swim Team, and Student Choreographer/Creative Director of Burbank high's Unleashed Dance Team. Haley coordinated events, designed T-shirts and maintained the websites for both teams. Moreover, her dance team taught choreography to the special needs students through the Bulldog Buddies program. The group learned the dance then the whole team performed together at the spring concert and school rally.
