# The 'Wal-Mart' of Drug Stores Just Became #1

R ecently, the stand-alone Sav-On stores – owned by Albertson's – were sold to CVS. This sale solidifies CVS from a once-minor player in the drug store chain business to the market leader in Southern California.

The problem is CVS is the 'Wal-Mart' of drug stores. Their employees get very little, if any, in the way of benefits, and over 65% of the company's stores operate non-union. Although CVS stores sell a wide variety of products, the lion's share of their profits comes from the prescription drug portion of their business.

When you make the decision to buy overpriced prescription drugs from CVS (or Sav-On) you are choosing to give your hard earned dollars to an anti-union organization in return making them millions of dollars in profits. Not only do they collect our small prescription co-pay at the cash register, but the Motion Picture & Television Trust Fund later sends this company countless dollars to cover the cost difference.

If you do your prescription business with CVS/Sav-On, I urge you to think twice and let them know you are taking your business elsewhere. Members can support their union brothers and sisters by simply having prescriptions filled at any of the six area union-staffed Costco stores. Best of all, you do not have to be a member of Costco to take advantage of their pharmacy services.

Costco also offers some of the lowest prices in the nation for name-brand prescription drugs and their generic equivalents. As an example, the generic equivalent to Compazine (used to prevent chemo-related nausea) is sold at CVS for approximately \$1.00 a pill. Patients shopping at Costco can purchase 150 pills for \$28.00.

The Teamsters have proudly represented Costco employees working at the Alhambra, Burbank, Inglewood, Northridge, Oxnard, and Santa Clarita locations for over two decades. (Be sure to call first; in many locations the pharmacy operating hours are limited.)






# Call Steward



# Retiree Spotlight on Doug Mathias

ike many Local 728 Liveteran members, Doug Mathias was born and raised in the motion picture industry. His father, Nelson Mathias, was a master bridge builder who eventually was recruited by the studios, and in 1936, became a charter member of GRIP Pictures in Studio City.

Mathias quickly became a Clyde Jackson, Bob Jacobsen and Brian Olson. regular on the lots accompanying his father to work. "I had a daily connection to motion picture filming, and remember being on the sets of serials frequently." Mathias recalled. "It was family to me."

Growing up on the sets with the children of his father's co-workers, Mathias guickly learned and became familiar with crew names and job titles.

In 1956 he graduated from Notre Dame High School and began working as a freelance photographer for a variety of companies including The Valley Times newspaper. The young patriot also served his country as a photographer in the Base Photo Lab with the California Air National Guard in the 146th Fighter Interceptor Wing based out of Van Nuvs.

Holding dear his passion for photography. Mathias headed back to the studios and in 1959 began work as a Prop Man for Four Star Productions at Republic Pictures. A variety of Westerns began filling his resume from Wanted Dead or Alive and The Law of the Plainsman to The Rifleman.

A friend in the lot's Camera Department told him he could work part-time in the Loading Room. "I loaded Mitchell Film magazines for a while. But in those days, the sons of cinematographers were the only ones that were admitted into the Camera Local 659," he remembered.

One day in 1960, Mathias was having lunch with his father in the studio commissary when a forklift supporting a crew riding in a basket drove by. "I asked my father what they did. He told me they were 728 'Juicers' - that's what they were called then."

Thinking the job looked like fun, Mathias pursued the interesting lot work and soon became a 'juicer' with Local 728. Starting wage for the young rigger was \$3.10 an hour.

"The first time I handled 4/0 cable and the 170 Arc. I thought maybe I had made a mistake," he recounted.

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In 1969, Mathias was working at Warner Bros. but still commissioned with the California Air National Guard Wing when the unit was activated for the Berlin Crisis. Duty called and he headed overseas for a year. He returned to Warner Bros. in 1962 – the same year the studio shutdown for a short time. Bouncing around lots, Mathias ended up at Universal Studios in 1964 working on the television series The Virginian.

"Everett Lehman was the Gaffer, and because I showed an interest in the lighting and was curious about why he placed the lights where he did, he asked me to watch the set up and then questioned me on what I would do with the lights."

Lehman offered his advice and expertise helping Mathias learn the intricacies of the trade. "I finally caught on to the 'formula,' but I soon learned that information varied from Gaffer to Gaffer," he pointed out.

Mathias worked as a Lamp Operator for Everett on a number of television series and a variety of features including Airport and The Andromeda Strain.

In 1969 member Ron McLeish moved to the Lighting Gaffer position and Mathias became his Best Boy. "I learned a lot of lighting techniques and shortcuts to speed up the lighting process."

together on a

television shows including Emergency, Alias Smith & Jones, The Bold Ones: The Lawyers, and Night Gallery.

In 1977 he started Gaffing at Universal and worked on a number of notable shows from Operation Petticoat and Quincy to Baa Baa Black Sheep.

"New cinematographers would come onto the Universal lot to do TV shows, and as happens, they would move on to shows at other lots. Fortunately for me, they would ask me to go with them."

In 1979, Mathias had the opportunity to work on a number of 'Movies of the Week' with Chuck Wheeler. "I learned a great deal more about photography from him," Mathias noted.

But it was a variety of talented cameramen – all whom had their 'bag of tricks' which Mathias would stash away for future use – that the veteran member feels blessed to have worked with over the years.

"Director of Photography, Enzo Martinelli, was the biggest resource of photographic tricks. I did The Hardy Boys TV pilot in 1977 with Enzo. He created a mysterious photographic look with the lights that would have
